


PERCENT OF WEB-BASED EXAMS IN 2015-2016

MESSAGE FROM THE DIRECTORS **AND STAFF**

Dear Friends

Every year there is change and growth at the Environmental Operators Certification Program. In 2015 there was more change than usual, with several new initiatives.

Our web-based exams have really taken off, with more than 60% of all exams now being taken online. This is great for our Operators, as exam results are almost instantaneous!

In partnership with the BCWWA, we completed the BC Water and Wastewater Sector Workforce Profile which confirmed what we had suspected: that the sector faces a labour shortage, and more needs to be done in the area of recruitment and succession planning.

Another major initiative was to provide support for the Water Smart Peer to Peer pilot study. The study was unequivocal in its findings that P2P training complements in-class training effectively, and the EOCP is working with organizations, Operators, and trainers to support the widespread implementation of P2P training, and recognition of this training via Continuing Education Unit (CEU) credits. Working with the Ministry of Health, a change has been made to the definition of a water treatment facility such that: "A facility that includes treatment using physical, chemical or biological processes, including any method of primary disinfection, to produce potable water is to be classified as a water treatment facility."

Changes have also been made to Direct Responsible Charge (DRC) which will enable more than one Operator at a time to earn DRC work experience, and encourage facilities/systems to make these opportunities available. It will also enable Level 1 Operators to begin accumulating DRC work experience (currently restricted to Levels II, III and IV); and require Operators of water distribution or wastewater collection systems to have DRC work experience to apply for Level III and IV operator

At the core of the revised DRC model is a mandatory DRC Plan. This is a form to be completed and approved by both the Chief Operator and the owner/manager.

2016 is the 50th Anniversary of the EOCP, and significant changes are expected in this landmark year. Some of our goals are: to build on our strengths to increase recruitment and training of Operators, to develop a three year strategic plan for the organization, to undertake an IT systems upgrade, and to increase collaboration with stakeholders to ensure an improved focus on public health and the environment.

We are honoured to serve the water and wastewater sectors of British Columbia and Yukon - providing more than 4.2 million people with safe drinking water and wastewater management - and we would like to thank all of you who have worked so hard to further the work of Operators working in the water and wastewater sectors.

CONTRACTUAL OBLIGATIONS (Note 8)

PURPOSE OF THE SOCIETY

Environmental Operators Certification Program Society (the "society") is a not-for-profit organization incorporated under the Societies Act of British Columbia. Management has determined that they are exempt from payment of income tax under Section 149(1) of the Income Tax Act

The society's mandate is to protect human health, the environment and the investment in facilities through increased knowledge, skill and proficiencies of the members of the program in all matters relating to water treatment and distribution and wastewater collection, treatment and disposal

BASIS OF PRESENTATION

The financial statements were prepared in accordance with Canadian Accounting Standards for Not-for-Profit Organizations (ASNFPO).

SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Comparative figures

Certain comparative amounts have been reclassified to conform to the current year's presentation. The cash flow has been presented to more closely match current year requirements.

Environmental Operators Certification Program Society follows the deferral method of accounting for

Restricted contributions are recognized as revenue in the year in which the related expenses are incurred. Unrestricted contributions are recognized as revenue when received or receivable if the amount to be received can be reasonably estimated and collection is reasonably assured. Endowment contributions, if and when applicable, are recognized as direct increases in net assets.

Membership fees are accrued in the year to which they are applicable

Restricted investment income is recognized as revenue in the year in which the related expenses are incurred. Unrestricted investment income is recognized as revenue when earned

Seminar fees are recognized as revenue when the seminars are held

Measurement uncertainty

When preparing financial statements according to ASNPO, management makes estimates and assumptions relating to:

- reported amounts of revenues and expenses
- · reported amounts of assets and liabilities
- disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities

Estimates are based on a number of factors including historical experience, current events and actions that the society may undertake in the future, and other assumptions that management believes are reasonable under the circumstances. By their nature, these estimates are subject to measurement uncertainty and actual results could differ. In particular, estimates are used in accounting for certain items such as revenues, allowance for doubtful accounts, useful lives of capital assets, asset impairments, legal and tax contingencies, employee compensation plans, employee benefit plans, retained interest in securitized receivables, income taxes, and goodwill impairment

Government grants

Government grants are recorded when there is a reasonable assurance that the society had complied with and will continue to comply with, all the necessary conditions to obtain the grants

The Capital Fund reports the assets, liabilities, revenues, and expenses related to Environmental Operators Certification Program Society's capital assets and building improvements campaign.

FINANCIAL INSTRUMENTS

The society is exposed to various risks through its financial instruments and has a comprehensive risk management framework to monitor, evaluate and manage these risks. The following analysis provides information about the society's risk exposure and concentration as of December 31, 2015.

Credit risk arises from the potential that a counter party will fail to perform its obligations. society is exposed to credit risk from members. In order to reduce its credit risk, the society encourages use of credit cards for payment and conducts regular reviews of its existing customers credit performance. An allowance for doubtful accounts is established based upon factors surrounding the credit risk of specific accounts, historical trends and other information.

FINANCIAL INSTRUMENTS (continued)

Interest rate risk is the risk that the value of a financial instrument might be adversely affected by a change in the interest rates. In seeking to minimize the risks from interest rate fluctuations, the society manages exposure through its normal operating and financing activities. exposed to interest rate risk primarily through its banking and credit facilities.

With a more thorough review of membership dues, it has now been determined that a certain percentage of members will not renew. The allowance for doubtful accounts has been set up based on this information.

DEFERRED INCOME

a) A Grant was received from the British Columbia Government prior to the current year. A portion of the Grant was received in 2011 and terms include improving premises and services. At this point, no reporting has been done so it is unclear as to whether this Grant would have other conditions attached to it. The conditions of the Grant appear to be outstanding.

b) During the year, the Society received a Grant from the Province of British Columbia in the amount of \$150,000 (2014 - \$150,000; 2013 - \$150,000)

c) An additional \$98,000 grant was received as payment for being involved in a joint consultant project.

CONTRACTUAL OBLIGATIONS

The Society entered into a lease agreement for premises with the Salvation Army expiring June 30, 2019 with a five year option for renewal on terms to be negotiated. Rent is calculated at 6% of gross receipts with a minimum monthly rental of \$1,400 or \$16,800 per annum. In addition, the lease requires payment for strata fees and property taxes of \$938 per month.
