Operator Safety Competition

he Operator Safety Competition was once again held at the BCWWA Annual Conference in Penticton in April. Bernie Morris of the Capital Regional District Water Department organized the competition. This year there was another good turnout with six teams entering the competition. First place went to the Resort Municipality of Whistler team of Mark Caulton, Shawn Rowley and Rankin Smith, along with Supervisor Nelson Bastien. Second place went to the Greater Vancouver Regional District #1 team of Rick Gagnon, Al Whiting and Roy Nees; with third place going to the GVRD #2 team of Dan Deacon, Tony Distasio, and Tony Smerychynski. Other teams were from the City of Vancouver, City of Richmond and the City of Coquitlam.

The scenario for the competition had a city works crew of three workers installing a steel culvert beneath a roadway. The culvert is 900 mm in diameter by 9 metres long and weighs almost 500 kg.

The culvert is being unloaded from a crane truck with the operator standing on the ground operating the controls. The truck is parked under a 25kV power line that has sagged below 9 metres due to a city electrical crew working on the power line one block down the road. One of the workers attaches a long steel choker to the culvert and the operator begins to lift the load



while the one worker on the ground holds the end to guide it. The other worker is on the deck of the crane truck.

The boom of the crane contacts the 25kV power line resulting in two workers receiving an electrical shock. The shock knocks the operator and the ground worker to the ground rendering the operator unconscious and pinning the one worker under the culvert. The one remaining crewmember is on the

ecent business from the EOCP Board Meeting held at the UBC Operator Symposium at UBC in Vancouver on May 14, 2001. Directors present: Joe McGowan, Eric Jackson, Bill Hyslop, Bernie Taekema, Dave McLean, Al Lane, Don Gare. Kevin Ramsay and Leo Albrecht were instructing courses. Bert Caine attended as a guest of the Board.

• Treasurer's Report:

Eric Jackson, Treasurer presented a detailed report, which included the following totals:

The Treasurer has retained the services of an accountant to review the financial statements.

- Joe McGowan, Chairman, reported that the EOCP Office is moving at the end of June. The new location is 219 – 3823 Henning Drive in Burnaby. The new location will provide additional office space and improved parking. The monthly lease will be \$936 plus GST.
 - The Chairman also reported that an application has been made to the Ministry of Health for assistance in covering operating costs and manpower to process small water system operators.
- Bernie Taekema reported that the majority of recent facility classifications have been for water treatment plants.
- The 2001 Vic Terry Award was presented to Louie Sabbas at the BCWWA Conference in Penticton. The EOCP Corporate Recognition Award was presented to the Port Alice Cellulose Operation.
- · Election Results:

Three operators ran for 2 operator positions. There were 259 ballots received.

Don Gare - elected (191 votes)

Dan Skidmore - elected (163 votes)

Rod McCabe - (109 votes)

Bill Hyslop – Industry Representative and Joe McGowan – Government Representative will continue in their respective positions by acclamation.

- The winner of the EOCP jacket was Evan Price of Chilliwack whose name was drawn from operators who returned their completed election ballots.
- Thirty year pins and lifetime memberships were awarded to: Caesar Turri, John Enman, Albert Gordon, Donald Morehouse and Robert Jonas.
- Proctoring Small System Exams:

Williams Lake Exam – June 8, 2001 – will be proctored by Al Lane or new Director, Dan Skidmore. Invigilators for exams in Dawson Creek and Parksville have not been determined.

A MOTION was made that the EOCP write a letter to BCWWA requesting that BCWWA cover costs to send a Director or hire an invigilator to proctor exams at upcoming exam sessions in Williams Lake, Dawson Creek and Parksville.

The EOCP Board will determine by July 31, 2001 how costs and scheduling for invigilators will be handled for the long term via a conference call among Directors.

- The Directory of Operators and Facilities will be published by September 2001.
- Development of an EOCP Personal Recognition Award: It was decided by the Board that it does not wish to develop this award at this time.
- CEU's for BCWWA Courses: The Chairman will advise the CEU Assessment Director that 4 day courses will receive 2.4 CEU's.
- Procedure for Notifying Corporate Recognition Award Recipient:

A MOTION was passed that EOCP pay for the Corporate Award recipient and guest to attend the BCWWA banquet only. The recipient will be notified by letter that he/she and guest are invited to the BCWWA banquet for the presentation of the award.

 In-house Computer Scanning, Scoring and Summary Sheets:

The Board does not have an exact cost yet for scanning equipment and/or software package.

Approximate cost will be \$3,000.00. Bill Hyslop will get information from Ontario Certification Program for the next meeting. After this information is received, the Board will make a decision and time frame for developing new Water Distribution Level I – IV exams.

Eric Jackson will review the EOCP agreement with ABC regarding EOCP marking our own exams.

2001 BCWWA Victor M. Terry Award

he Vic Terry Award is a BC Water and Waste award that recognizes an operator who has demonstrated ingenuity and proficiency in plant operations or maintenance. The Environmental Operators Certification Program makes nominations for the award.

Many times, awards are presented to those who work in larger facilities primarily because their work is more visible to more people. This year the EOCP is pleased to recognize an operator of a small water system and small wastewater system who typifies the kind of resourcefulness and ingenuity so much needed by an operator. This is particularly significant in a year when the BCWWA and the EOCP have focused so much attention on small systems.

This year's recipient of the Vic Terry Award is Louie Sabbas. Louie has been the primary operator of the water and wastewater in the remote community of Hot Springs Cove for twelve years. This small village has about 120 people and is reached only by plane or boat thirty-five miles north of Tofino on the west coast of Vancouver Island.

The small water system consists of a groundwater source, piped to the community where it is chlorinated and pumped to the customers. The sewer system is a conventional gravity system with a single lift station pumping to a pretreatment facility. Louie is also responsible for garbage collection and operation of the community incinerator. Should something go wrong, Louie is on his own. The nearest community is Tofino, an hour away by boat in good weather.

Louie is a BCWWA member and is an EOCP certified Level II Water Distribution Operator. He attends training courses whenever he is able to get away and offers his expertise and experience to other small communities along the coast. A major interest of his is seeing other operators in small communities obtain certification.

Louie is a long time resident and is very active in his community. He is married and has four children. His hobbies



include the community basketball program and escorting his kids to various basketball tournaments up and down the coast, with a little sport fishing thrown in when he has time. ■





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2001 EOCP Awards

he BERT CAINE award is presented by the EOCP in recognition of outstanding long-term service to the certification program. The award is named in honour of Mr. B.D. Caine, the first Secretary-Treasurer of the program. The award was presented to Bert in 1989, to Bob Wilson in 1991 and presented again in 2000 to Bill Hyslop. At the 2001 UBC Operators Symposium, Bert Caine presented the award to Eric Jackson. Eric was first certified as an operator in 1978, and

was elected to the Board in 1981. Eric has served on the Board continuously for twenty years and continues as the Treasurer.

The EOCP Corporate Recognition Award was presented to Ron Palmer, Utilities Manager of the Western Pulp Limited Partnership, Port Alice Cellulose Operations. The Port Alice Operations was the first Industrial Mill to have their facility certified by the EOCP, and have encouraged their operators to be certified as Industrial Wastewater Treatment Operators.

truck deck, conscious and uninjured, but is extremely excited and not in complete control of his senses. He does have two-way radio and contacts the rescue unit to attend.

The Rescue Teams faced the following complications:

- 1. The ambulance cannot arrive for at least 15 minutes.
- 2. The power line is arcing onto the crane.
- 3. One worker is pinned under the culvert with burns and a frac-
- tured femur. The crane operator also has burns and is unconscious. The worker on the truck deck is excited and agitated.
- 4. The Rescue Team must assess the injured workers, remove the workers and provide acceptable first aid.

Thanks to the BCWWA, Bernie Morris, John Riches, Safety Officer from the City of Penticton, the WCB and St. John's Ambulance for their assistance with the Safety Competition.









PLANT PROFILE: Capital Regional District Saanich Peninsula Wastewater Treatment Plant

PROJECT DEVELOPMENT

- · A 1991 study concluded that a new wastewater treatment plant was needed on the Saanich Peninsula to replace three older plants that were either out of permit or expensive to operate.
- The big question was: Where should the plant be located?
- After assessing eleven sites over a period of four years (1992-1996) the Bazan Bay Road site was selected and rezoned by North Saanich Council.
- · An alternative access road to the site was constructed off Mainwaring Road.
- The project was approved by the Minister of Environment in November 1996, and with the receipt of a 50% provincial grant, the system design was commenced in 1997.
- · Construction of the plant began in early 1998 and was completed within budget by the end of 1999.
- The plant began to treat sewage in early February 2000 and the transition to the new plant was complete by mid February and classified as a Class IV Plant.



Screens

 The influent wastewater is passed through a 6mm traveling screen to remove bulk solids. The screenings are washed, compacted and removed for disposal to the landfill. The screened wastewater proceeds to primary clarifiers.

Primary Clarifiers

Wastewater enters two rectangular tanks. Solids that settle to the bottom of the tanks are removed to the solids blend tank and the liquid effluent proceeds to the aeration tanks.

Aeration Tanks

Wastewater is treated in one of the two aeration tanks. Each tank biologically treats the sewage.

Secondary Clarifiers


The final process takes place in the two secondary clarifiers. Solids that settle on the bottom of the tanks are either returned to the aeration tanks or to the gravity belt thickener. Final effluent leaving the secondary clarifiers is discharged out the 1.5 km marine outfall.

Construction of the plant began in early 1998 and was completed within budget by the end of 1999.









SOLID PROCESS CONSISTS OF THE FOLLOWING THREE PROCESSES:

Gravity Belt Thickener

 Secondary sludge is thickened on the gravity belt and then sent to the sludge blend tank.

Dewatering Press

 Blended primary and secondary sludge is removed from the blend tank. Water is removed by the press. The solids ore sent to the lime stabilization/pasteurization process.



Lime Stabilization/Pasteurization

 In this final process, lime is added to the dewatered sludge and is heated to 70C for 30 minutes. The end product is a pasteurized biosolid which can be used as an unrestricted soil conditioner.



BCWWA Small Water Systems Course

he B.C. Water and Waste Association has recently completed four pilot Small Water Systems courses; in Creston, Port Moody and at the UBC Operator Symposium. The Small Water Systems course is tailored for operators of those small facilities such as resorts, separate subdivisions, etc. where the facility serves under 500 people. The course is two days in length and operators have the opportunity to write the EOCP certification exam, once they qualify.

The four pilot courses averaged twenty people in attendance, and another two courses are scheduled for June, in Parksville and Williams Lake. The Small Water Systems course will undergo changes and adjustments as experience and feedback from the courses are assessed. The BCWWA intends to present the Small Water Systems course throughout the province beginning this fall, and to train up to 2500 small water system operators over the next three years.


The Small Water Systems course is tailored for operators of facilities which serve under 500 people.




Drainage Department as a maintenance worker and operated the backhoe, vacuum and flush truck, grade-all and grader.
